Rhinebeck, N.Y. – Dr. Donald Meichenbaum, one of the founders of Cognitive Behavior Therapy, and voted as "one of the ten most influential psychotherapists of the century," in a survey of North American clinicians, will speak on "Creating a Safe Community" on March 25, 2008 at 7:30 a.m. at the Poughkeepsie Grand Hotel. Dr. Meichenbaum will offer a positive perspective on how to create safety within the community, and the cost to society of violence in youth and its long-term implications for the community. Dr. Meichenbaum is Distinguished Professor Emeritus from the University of Waterloo, Ontario, Canada and presently Distinguished Visiting Professor at the School of Education at the University of Miami. He is Research Director of the Melissa Institute for Violence Prevention in Miami.

A special training workshop, sponsored by The Astor Home for Children, will take place from 10 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. at the Poughkeepsie Grand Hotel. This workshop is open to mental health professionals, nurses, psychiatrists, students, interns, teachers, school clinicians and educators, and agencies. Dr. Meichenbaum will offer specific strategies to use evidence-based programs to alter the developmental course of high-risk children, youth and their families. This workshop will also highlight the role of gender differences, co-morbid disorders, especially the impact of victimization experiences on brain development. He will also discuss the role of depression/suicidality, school-based behavioral and academic interventions, parent training, and ways to bolster resilience.
